Statistical Overview

Because of the difficulties in obtaining annual statistics from the Internet Archive, the usage statistics presented are cumulative (to June 30th, 2023) for both platforms.

All 16 collections saw at least moderate increases in usage during 2022-2023. The Essex County (Ontario) High School Yearbooks, the City of Windsor Directories, and the Windsor and Region Publications collections were particularly well used.

SWODA Images

As of June 30th, 2023, the database contains 3,572 historical photographs, postcards, and ephemera of southwestern Ontario – primarily of Windsor and Essex County. For the period of July 1st, 2022 – June 30th, 2023, SWODA Images had 94,356 users and 137,860 page views. This marks a significant increase (>40%) in the number of users for 2022-2023 over the previous year. However, there was an overall decrease in page views. SWODA Images was one of the databases affected by the University cyberattack. The cumulative number of page views since July 1st, 2011 is 1,943,720.

The Twitter account: SWODA@SWODAUWindsor started in September 2017. Generally, images with text are tweeted once a week to hashtags ThrowbackThursdays and YQG. The account currently has 384 followers.

SWODA Annual Report 2022-2023 Descriptive Notes

General

The cyberattack on the University began on June 20th, 2022 and continued to affect operations and services for most of the Summer. This delayed many SWODA activities and caused reductions in the usage of many of the SWODA databases. During this time, and working around the challenges, the new Ristech Book2net III scanner was installed downstairs in Leddy West, room WG-02. Our old Book2net II scanner was placed in Acquisitions/Bibliographic Services.

Changes to the Canadian copyright act, in particular the increase of the general protection term from 50 to 70 years, has meant that we can no longer add new volumes to certain collections.

Activities Completed and Underway

Three new collections were added to **SWODA Publications** this year:

- 1. The <u>University of Windsor Calendars</u> is the largest at 122 volumes. It is comprised of the sub-collections: undergraduate calendars, graduate calendars, general calendars and other calendars. All of the born print volumes are now online. We are working with the Registrar's Office, the Senate, and IT Services, to get all of the born digital volumes converted to pdf format and posted online. This should be completed in the 2023-2024 academic year.
- 2.The <u>Emancipation Celebration Programs</u> form part of the E. Andrea Moore Collection which was donated to the University Archives and Special Collections. There are 25 volumes which span the years from 1937 to 1967. This collection documents the efforts of the British-American Association of Coloured Brothers, and especially Walter L. Perry who was known as "Mr. Emancipation", to organize multi-day, international festivities in Jackson Park, Windsor.
- 3. The <u>University of Windsor Faculty of Engineering Yearbooks</u> were digitized and put online at the request of the Faculty of Engineering. There are 18 volumes which cover 1973-2001.

We have also added 19 volumes to the <u>Essex County (Ontario) High School Yearbooks</u> collection. Because of the copyright changes, we will not be adding years after 1971; however, we will continue to fill in gaps, as we can. There is coverage for 22 different schools and the yearbooks date from the 1920s to 1971.

Four new volumes, 1972, 1973, 1974, and 1976, were added to the <u>City of Windsor Directories</u> collection. We were able to conclude a copyright agreement with the Ontario Genealogical Society and the final Vernon Publishing copyright holders. This will allow us to move ahead with digitizing all volumes of this title, which ceased in 2014. Because of the size of the volumes and the work involved, it may take a number of years before they are all online.

A small number of items were added to the SWODA Images database. These were mainly photographs from the E. Andrea Moore Collection.

We are currently working on 2 related collections: the Assumption College Alumni Chatter and the Assumption University/University of Windsor Alumni Times. This is in part to support the work of the Alumni Association and the University's 60th anniversary celebrations.

On February 14th, the CBC published an article and aired an interview with me on the Omeka exhibit: Windsor: Ontario's Gretna Green: https://cdigs.uwindsor.ca/omeka-s/s/Windsor-ontario-gretna-green/page/home This exhibit examines the incredible marriage phenomenon in this region from about 1885-1913. Windsor and Sandwich became a haven for couples from the United States looking for quick and discrete weddings.

On June 23rd, International Women in Engineering Day, there were a number of articles published on the Library's Twitter and Facebook accounts based on my exhibit about Dr. Queenie Halford Shirley: A Female Pioneer in Electrical Engineering: https://cdigs.uwindsor.ca/omeka-s/s/QueenieHalfordShirley/page/QueenieHalfordShirley

Both of these Omeka exhibits were moved onto a secure server (SSL certification) during 2022/2023.

I am currently working on expanding and updating "A brief history of Libraries at Assumption College and the University of Windsor". It will also eventually become an online Omeka exhibit.

Finally, materials scanned and saved on the s: network drive of the in-house Leddy server are now being regularly backed up to the OCUL Ontario Library Research Cloud.
